10% RESERVE ON '91 CROP-- Almond Board voted yesterday to RELEASE this reserve. The vote was 7 to 3 with representatives of Dole, Cal-Almond and Monte Cristo voting against. We were surprised by the early release vote and amused by the role reversal in voting. The release will become effective when signed by USDA. We do not expect much change in the market as a result-- not many handlers had withdrawn as a result of selling 90% already.

 ${\underline{\sf MARKET}}$ CONTINUES SLOW AND STEADY with grower prices the same or a couple cents lower:

Nonpareil 1.23 to 1.27 California 1.15 to 1.17

The next two months is a good time to think about <u>forward sales</u> of 1992 crop almonds on part of your crop. Prices today would be close to current levels. Please call if you are interested.

ALMOND DELIVERIES BY GROWERS reached 443 million 1bs by October 15-- just 17 million 1bs short of the crop estimate. We expect the actual crop to exceed the estimate when it is all in.

WATER ISSUES will become increasingly important in the years to come-- ground water regulation (quality and pumping), surface water transfers and agricultural vs. urban allocation. We have found a good history of water development in the West-- with startling projections: Cadillac Desert by Marc Reisner. We also subscribe to "Western Water", a periodical from the Water Education Foundation in Sacramento. My partners, staff and I send you our best wishes and hope that the coming holidays are a good time for you and your family. We welcome home the last of the American hostages from Beirut as we pack our first container of almonds for Lebanon.
